It should typed when you turn it in. Points will be taken off if it is emailed to me instead of turning in a paper copy.

You are welcome to use a site like easybib.com to create your MLA citations. Below is the proper format for MLA citations for different sources and an example of what your completed annotated bibliography should look like.

For BOOKS:

Lastname, Firstname. Title of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication. Print.

For PERIODICALS (magazines, newspapers, scholarly journals):

Author(s). "Title of Article." Title of Periodical Day Month Year: pages. Print.

For WEB PUBLICATIONS (websites or images from the web):

Editor, author, or compiler name (if available). Name of Site. Publisher, year (if available). Accessed on

Date. Medium of publication.
